A truly National Museum of Brewing, celebrating the industrious history of Burton upon Trent and beyond - a place of living heritage

What is the concept?

- → To create a modern, national museum that brings together and celebrates the heritage of Burton upon Trent and the wider history of brewing both in the town and beyond.
- ⇒ To establish something that is 'living', continually evolving to showcase different historic moments from the town and able to better join itself with the cultural history of Burton upon Trent, in place and people.
- ⇒ To incorporate technology to help visitors truly experience the Burton upon Trent of the past through virtual and real simulation activities, becoming an interactive display of the town's history.
- ⇒ To celebrate the people of Burton upon Trent through community led initiatives and exhibitions, bringing people's memories and history to life.



How will this be achieved?

Through working with local historians (Heritage Working Group), communities and Trusts (including the National Brewery Heritage Trust) in order to create something for Burton upon Trent that is led by the communities that reside in the town.

By bringing together local knowledge and industry experts to further design and develop the concept for a modern museum that can showcase both the local heritage as well as the national.

In exploring wider funding opportunities both for the creation of the museum itself and for its longer term, ongoing sustainability, including funding strands such as grants, private/public investment, and hospitality/function income.



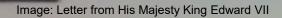
What would be displayed?

There is a wealth of archives and artefacts available to this museum as a result of the National Brewery Centre closure, however it is important this museum isn't simply a recreation of the NBC, but rather something that adds value to that core collection.

In addition to that collection, we will look to support:

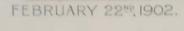
- ⇒ Artefacts relating to Burton upon Trent's pre-industrial history;
- ⇒ Community led exhibitions, focusing on local people;
- ⇒ The repatriation of 'lost' artefacts;
- New exhibits and displays to share the wider Burton upon Trent story;

There will also be an initial focus on identifying key large exhibits, existing and new, including those that are specifically of local interest as well as those of national importance.

About the buildings

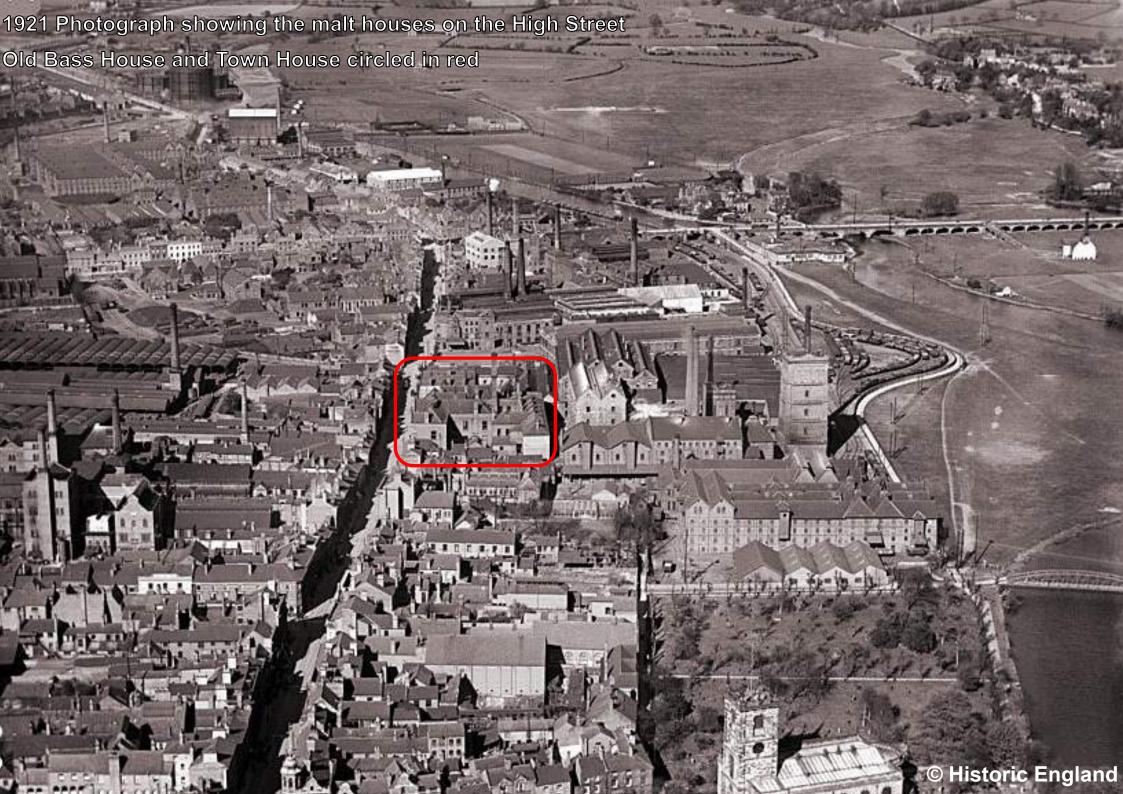


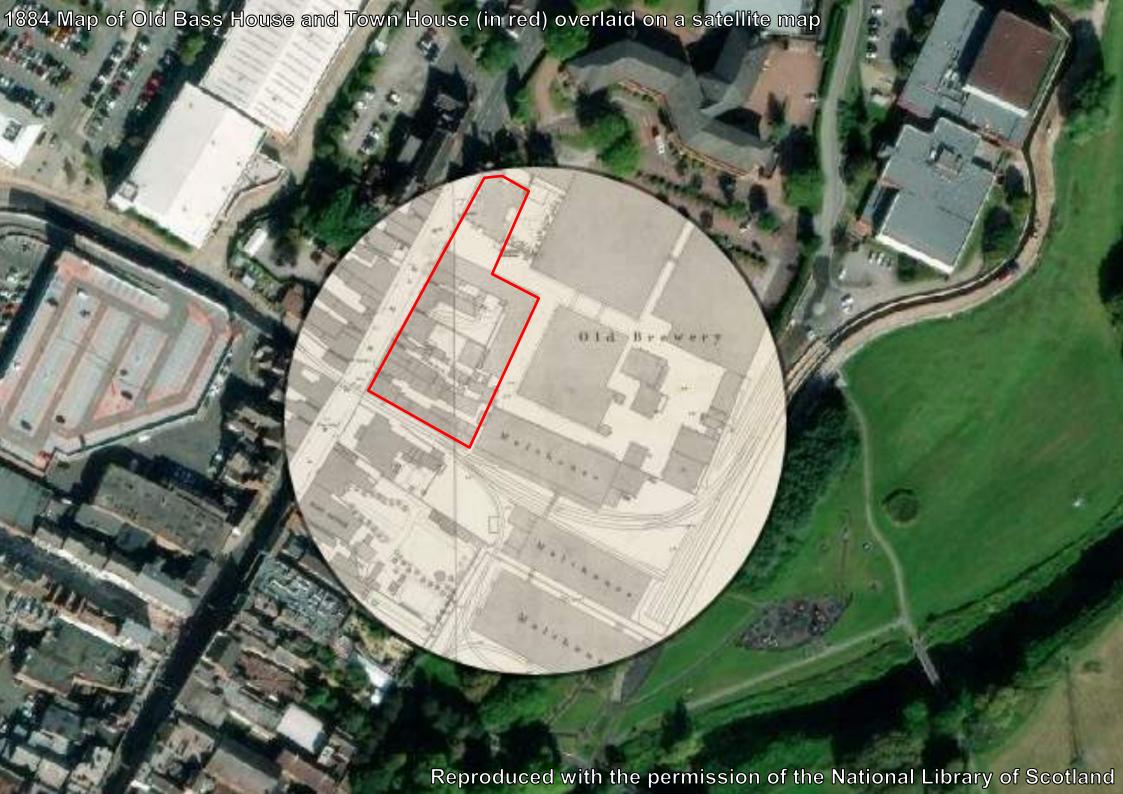
Late 18th Century Town House for Bass Brewery, where William Bass lived, and which was passed down to his descendants. Used as visitor accommodation in the late 19th Century, a purpose that it retained until 2022. Grade II Listed.



Late 19th Century office building constructed in the stylings of Town House and built to commemorate 100 years of Bass Brewery. A much larger building than Town House, used as offices until the 2010's. Grade II Listed.

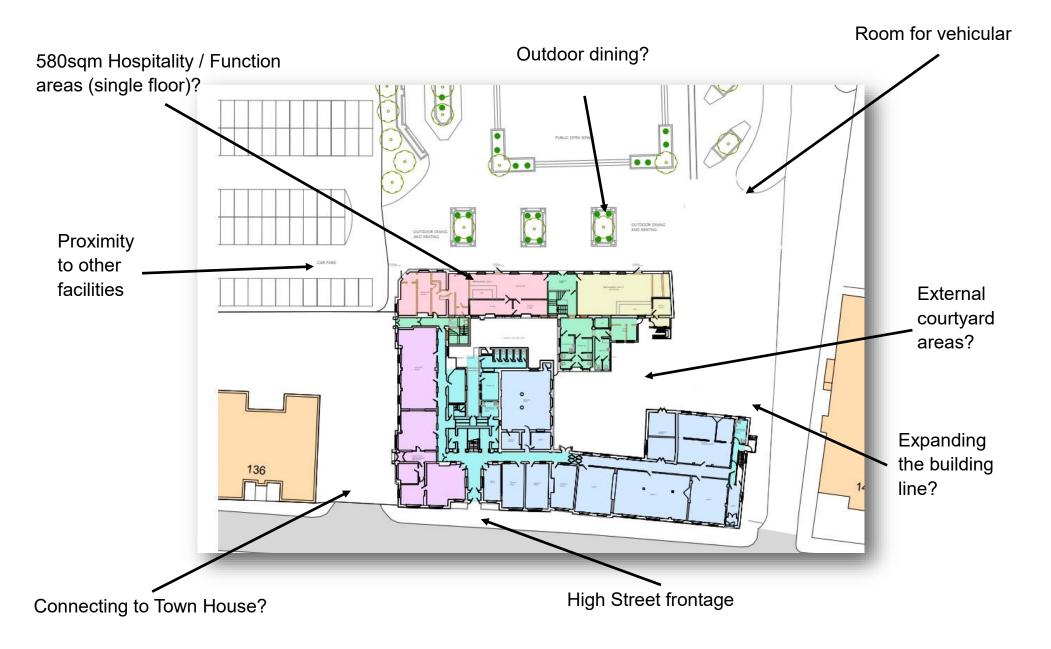
Initially, the Heritage Working Group will consider how Town House could be used to showcase Burton upon Trent's heritage more broadly, with Old Bass House focusing on national brewing history. Both buildings would then be brought together under a single Heritage and Brewing Museum concept.

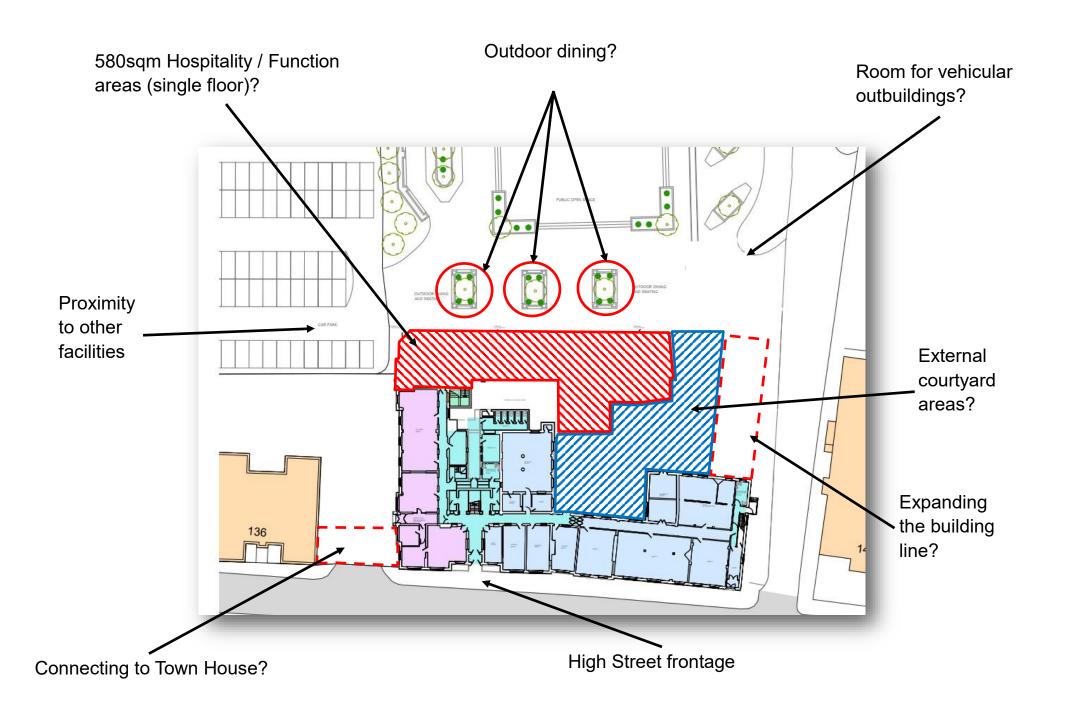


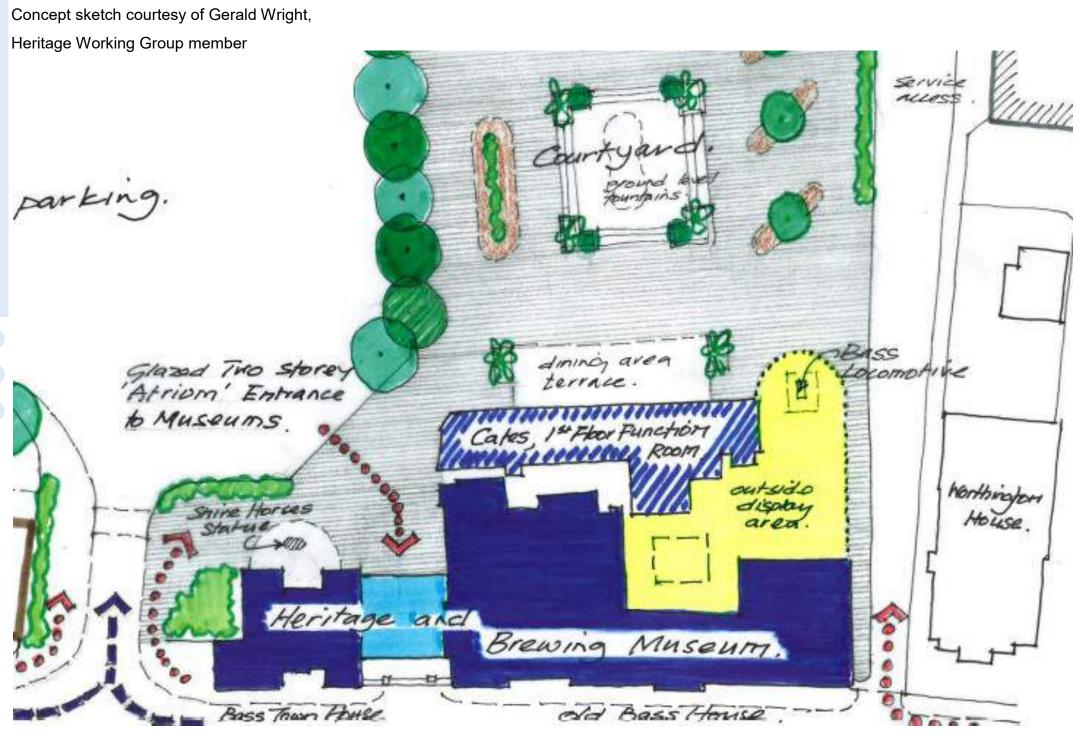




Early building concept ideas (Bass House)

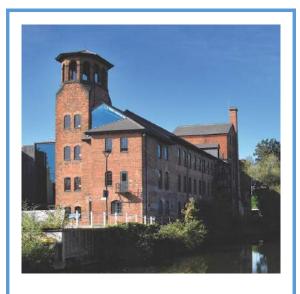






What is the inspiration?

There are a number of modern museums that celebrate the past through immersive and interactive experiences, such as:



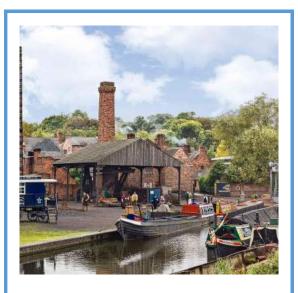
THE MUSEUM OF MAKING

This museum utilises technology to create a 3D virtual tour where people can simulate a walk through the exhibits on display.



TITANIC (BELFAST)

This museum has tours and experiences where visitors can use interactive displays that create an authentic retelling of the story, incorporating sounds and smells to enhance the user experience.



BLACK COUNTRY LIVING MUSEUM

An interactive museum that offers physical simulation events to visitors, taking part and interacting rather than just demonstrating.



How and when will this be delivered?

This new museum needs to bring together the best of the National Brewery Centre collection and the broader history of Burton upon Trent in a way that is modern and interactive for visitors – which isn't a quick process.

This project is part of the **Towns Fund programme** for Burton upon Trent, which concludes in March 2026. A detailed feasibility study is already underway, which will look at how this project fits within that programme, and early indications identify an achievable completion date for works of 30th September 2025, subject to funding, planning and other approvals.

Alongside the Towns Fund, the Council is exploring other funding strands to help bring this concept to life, including the Levelling Up Fund, Heritage Lottery Fund, and other private or public forms of investment.

Different funding strands will have their own timescale requirements and so until these are fully explored, it's not possible at this time to confirm the exact timeframes for each phase of the project across the **three year programme**. More information will follow the completion of the feasibility study.



What will happen in the meantime?

The existing collection at the National Brewery Centre will be stored and maintained while the project to create the new museum is underway. Some loaned items may return to owners for a period of time until they can be appropriately displayed back in Burton upon Trent.

It is proposed that the archive collection will be stored and displayed in a <u>temporary National Archive Centre</u> in a town centre unit where members of the public will be able to visit and access the collection at any point during the project works. The collection will be stored in climate controlled and fire safe conditions.

Molson Coors have made a commitment to ensuring ongoing access to the artefact collection for volunteer groups and to explore the opportunity for special events to take place to safely allow public access to the artefact collection held in the Joiners Shop as well as outdoor exhibits, such as the Robey Engine.

As such, access to the existing collection will be maintained during the interim period between closure of the NBC and opening of the new museum, with future details on this to be issued shortly.



How will people be kept updated?

We are proposing to launch a new Regeneration Engagement Hub, which would be co-located with the temporary National Archive Centre in a single building.

Regular project updates, exhibitions and engagement events will be located in this facility during the project works, which will be open to members of the public during usual trading hours and act as a physical single point of contact for project information.

This proposal for this facility includes:

- 300m² secure archive library 150m² activity/education
 - room
- area
- Regeneration project update Rotational artefact display area
- 90m² of working space for the project team and Trust
- Climate control, alarm and fire safety systems

The Regeneration Hub / National Archive Centre proposal is still being developed ahead of Member review and so more information on this will be issued later in December / January.

Alongside this, other press releases, social media updates, videos and associated communication activities will be undertaken during the project.
